Today's speaker was Lee Morgan - Eagle's Eye Photo Imaging

Lee had a great presentation consisting primarily of a large collection of photographs and images from some of his many jobs and adventures. But before the slide show of actual images, Mr. Morgan showed some digital renditions of the universe and an interesting perspective of just how tiny our existence is in that expansive place. From earth's relationship to our sun; to earth's relationship to the solar system; expanding out to the Local Galaxy Cluster; to the Local Super Cluster; to the Observable Universe; to someplace "...where no man has ever gone before"...Really hard to comprehend just how far away the end of that 'Observable' Universe is, and what a very small part our world plays. But regarding views more comprehensible: Lee showed how his aerial pictures can be used to provide developers, investors and sellers with a view of property from a useful perspective; and with the ability to overlay outlines, streets, identifying names and markers, Lee is able to also let the customer see their property in relation to things like access roads and make-up of the surrounding areas. Lee is capable of providing real time views of roof work, construction jobs or other work site activities for use in analyzing progress or displaying 'before and after' job comparisons. His pictures have been used to review ingress and egress to the Balloon Fiesta parking lots; and for Fiesta staff to count how many cars were actually there. Heck, Lee could also provide useful maps and guidance for successfully navigating the corn field mazes that pop up in the fall. Watching Lee's slide show, we realize that Dead Poet's Society's Professor Keating had the right idea to have students stand on the desk in order to get a different perspective of their world...it was just a few thousand feet lower than where one finds the really good views. Although the lofty sights were all spectacular, Eagle's Eye Photo Imaging also has the ability to capture the beauty, the intricate details, and maybe even the soul of subjects firmly planted on terra firma. Whether the subjects are humans, animals, or inanimate objects, Lee's camera skills, and the HDR photographic techniques that he employs, result in pictures that have amazing detail and, actually, a fine artwork characteristic about them. - ♦ Thank you to TJ Maloy for the Open House at his place of business — Waterjet Cutting. As was expected, there are many items throughout the facility that have been fabricated the waterjets that live within. Beginning at the front door, where the stop was attached to the door via a metal plate and cut out wording proudly proclaiming that it is a "door-stop". A restroom door has a cut-out M&M character noting the Ladies Room. There are a couple of shelves with a wide variety of water-jetted samples. Plastic things; metal things; tile things; wooden things; and even carpet things. Some were cut out wording; some were logo-type designs; some were the parts for other thing and steel blades to be polished into fine knives. All cut with the garnet infused water stream from one of the three available machines. One job finished while we were there. The jet had cut pieces from a thick, probably 3ft x 6ft x 1/4in steel plate. The pieces would be used in the building of a two layered table top. The now available jet was set to cut a wavy pattern through a laptop computer. In just minutes, there were smooth cuts right through the keys, circuit boards and case. Then there is the thinking outside the box stuff: The company is renovating a room to make a more formal office area. The interior design requires the sheetrock to be cut in intricate angles and shapes for proper fitting trim and vent openings. The non-standard cuts have been made with the waterjet machines in order to efficiently get very precise corners, angles and edges. All truly amazing work. Not enough room left to tell you about the Rhino board, or the futuristic vortex cooling device TJ uses to mitigate heat generated by the operating jet machines. Ask TJ about those. All quite interesting stuff. Thank You again TJ for the very educational Open House.
